War in Ukraine

In the period leading up to the invasion of Ukraine by the Russian military, we began collating resources on the NFPB website. Our aim is one of promoting wider understanding of the context, and raising awareness of some of the possible routes to peace. We have continued to do this throughout the period since 24 February, with the page (https://nfpb.org.uk/ukraine_2022/) being regularly updated. We hope this has been and will continue to be a useful resource for Friends and more widely.

Friends have been active in a number of ways, in support of refugees, in witnessing for peace and speaking out against continued and increasing militarism. Quakers in Huddersfield, for instance, are holding their peace vigils on a weekly basis. As well as calling for peace in Ukraine, these vigils are reminding people of the UK's role in supplying arms to Saudi Arabia that are used in the ongoing war in Yemen.

NFPB has been part of discussions with Quaker and non-Quaker partners about responses to the war and convened its own meeting for NFPB members to consider the issues and implications of the war for peace work in the future, following up the meeting of Board members on 5th March: see overleaf for a report of that meeting.

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Love. Pray. Make Peace. Report of NFPB members' meeting

The war in Ukraine was the thread that ran throughout the first full meeting of NFPB in 2022, on 5 March. Thirty Friends gathered online, with new members joining us and most Area Meetings being represented. Some Friends were unable to stay for the whole meeting as they were supporting peace witness in different parts of the country.

In considering Northern Friends Peace Board's continuing work, we were only too aware of the likely effects on this of the war. From work on nuclear weapons abolition, to challenging military spending to promoting rethinking security, the work goes on but will need to adapt and change. We heard a number of suggestions for what else might be required of us in the coming period and NFPB members will continue to meet to reflect and to develop ideas for action. Trustees reported on a small increase in financial contributions from Friends in 2021, and also presented a revised governing document – which was accepted by members.

In small groups and in the whole meeting, Friends had time for listening to feelings and responses to the international crisis that had developed over the previous ten days, reflecting on the implications for the world and for our work in the world. Friends acknowledged fears, distress and a sense of feeling powerless. We were reminded of the importance and value of finding practical ways of taking action, from supporting young people, to collecting and sorting out materials for refugees, to continuing the work of building peace where we are.

In some ways, what we are led to do is simple: Love. Pray. Make Peace. We heard that these words had been put on display at a Leeds Meeting House. But we also know and were reminded that neither our peace testimony nor pacifism have ever been simple; and they are not now.

There was a concern that the intense media coverage of the war can be emotionally difficult to deal with; we need to look after ourselves and one another. We need to be ready to listen, creating spaces for hearing others, acknowledging the fears and uncertainties. Building empathy and recognising our common humanity, how might we be led to take action to reach across barriers?

We were reminded that this is not the only war nor the only crisis facing the world. Militarism and war are linked to other crises, from climate change to racism, from political corruption to inequality. This gives an added imperative to continue to promote and build change towards a radically different type of security. Sharing our vision and hope can encourage others who are seeking and trying to walk a different path.

The meeting closed in a period of stillness.

Climate and militarism – webinar

We were pleased to collaborate with the Quaker Council for European Affairs (QCEA) and Quakers in Britain in hosting a webinar in January on the theme of “Is COP26 enough? Peace, militarism, and the climate crisis: a missing piece”.

This attracted more than 80 participants, from Europe and beyond, with speakers Sheila Babauta, an indigenous elected representative from the Northern Mariana Islands, and Stuart Parkinson, from Scientists for Global Responsibility.

The speakers gave analysis and insight into the effects of militarism on climate and the challenges of holding governments to account for this impact.

Rethinking Security

NFPB is an active member of this network, being particularly involved with its outreach activities. Rethinking Security is a network of UK-based organisations, academics and activists, working for a just and peaceful world, based on approaches that address the underlying causes of conflict and insecurity. From late February to the end of March we supported Rethinking Security in running a 5-week Woodbrooke course, which attracted participants from the UK and beyond.

The course explored different aspects of human security and included analysis of the UK government’s current approaches to security and how this might be developed with different priorities. It finished with a session introducing possible ways of getting involved in research as part of the Alternative Security Review.

Nuclear weapons prohibition treaty

The Covid-19 pandemic continues to disrupt events. The first meeting of the states who have ratified the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons <https://nfpb.org.uk/tpnw-info/> was to have taken place in March, but this is now going to be from 21-23 June, in Vienna. It was decided to postpone as holding it as an in-person event would enable a range of civil society groups to also be involved with activities around the conference.

In the meantime, an important report has been published. Written by Rebecca Johnson, *Nuclear Weapons Are Banned! What Does This Mean For Britain?* analyses the treaty and makes clear recommendations about how the UK could /should respond to this UN agreement. It's a substantial piece of work and an invaluable resource for those who want to learn more about the treaty and its implications in working towards disarmament. As the report says, and as we have been reminded by the war in Ukraine:

"Nuclear weapons continue to threaten the world with war and terror. ... Recent events provide a stark reminder of what can go wrong when possessing and relying on nuclear weapons for deterrence: dangerous leaders, miscalculations, escalation, 'use them or lose them' pre-emptive strikes... it only takes a hundred Hiroshima-sized bombs to cause nuclear winter and global starvation."

Global Days of Action on Military Spending – 13 April – 12 May

The Global Day of Action on Military Spending (GDAMS) has been taking place across the world since 2011, to coincide with the release of the SIPRI (Stockholm International Peace Research Institute) figures on world wide military spending. The new figures are an opportunity to together with groups across the world in amplifying this vital issue in the public consciousness. Since 2017 the event has been expanded to Days of Action to cover a number of other important dates for the campaign messaging such as Tax Day in the US.

As the latest campaign mailing says: *The focus for 2022 will be a call for peace in Ukraine and an end to the spiralling arms race. In the last weeks we've seen billions in new funding allocated to weaponry, ostensibly in order to deter Putin. The problem is NATO already outspends Russia 18:1, overspending as a strategy to contain Putin has failed. We need a new strategy based on developing common security.*

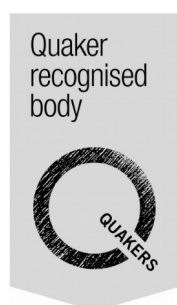
